Prior to 2014, as Major Groups Coordinator for the United Nations Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA) Division for Sustainable Development, she facilitated the engagement of and consultation with worldwide non-State actors (NGOs, women's groups, business and industry, etc.) in the SDGs negotiations and the United Nations Rio+20 Conference. As Sustainable Development Officer for UNDESA (2007-2010), she served as focal point for food

security and sustainable agriculture as well as sustainable consumption and production (SCP) where she successfully supported the negotiations of the 10 Year Framework of Program on SCP, now SDG12. Prior to joining the United Nations, she worked as Head, Environment, Economy and Trade Division of the North American Free Trade Agreement Commission for Environmental Cooperation (2000-2007), as policy analyst for the Wallace Institute for Alternative Agriculture (1998-2000) and as postdoctoral fellow for the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) in the Brazilian Amazon (1996-1998). She is a World Academy of Art and Science Fellow, was chosen for the Ideagen 2016 and 2020 "100 Individuals and Organization empowering women and girl", is a 2006 Yale World Fellow and a United Nations Environment Programme Who's Who's of Women and the Environment. She has co-authored a book on Ethical Investing and regularly publishes journal articles, book chapters and Secretary-General reports. Dr. Carpentier obtained her PhD. in Agricultural and Environmental Economics from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, as well as both her MSc. and BSc. in Agriculture Economics from McGill University. Born in Canada, Dr. Carpentier is fluent in English, French, Spanish, Portuguese and possess a strong knowledge of Mandarin. She competes in ultramarathon, ironmen and is second dan black belt.



Douglas Ragan, Chief and Unit Leader for Youth and Livelihoods for UN-Habitat, Nairobi, Kenya. Doug has worked in youth development with NGOs, local and national governments and the United Nations for the past 25 years. Currently he is the Unit Leader for Youth and Livelihoods for UN-Habitat, managing UN-Habitat's Global portfolio on youth development in over 75 developing countries. The programmes focus on urban youth development, including youth employment, governance and participation. He manages three flagship youth programmes for UN-Habitat: the Urban Youth Fund, Youth 21 initiative and the One Stop Youth Resource Centres. Doug has authored and co-authored a number of research and policy publications on urban youth issues faced by marginalized young people in Africa, Asia, the Middle East and Latin America. Doug holds a Bachelor's Degree in Latin American Studies, a Master's Degree in Management for the Voluntary

Sector and is currently working undertaking a PhD in urban planning, with a focus on youth-led organizations in slums. In his previous role as director for the Environmental Youth Alliance from 1991 – 2007, Doug worked with marginalized communities globally such as aboriginal, immigrant and refugee and street youth to develop livelihood programmes. Douglas has also coordinated multi-year programs such as the Growing up in Cities (Canada) program (2003-2005), Youth Action Effecting Change (2002-2004), the Youth Community Asset Mapping Program (2002-2004) and Get Out! Olympic Youth Legacy program (2005).



Mr. Oli Henman, is an Organizing Partner of the NGO Major Group and the Global Coordinator of Action for Sustainable Development. Oli leads the global advocacy and engagement with multilateral bodies such as the UN and other international institutions. He has considerable experience of working with civil society participation and governance in South America, Europe and around the world. In his previous role at CIVICUS he led key advocacy on the SDG negotiations, including leading roles in the 'Sustainable Development 2015' and Action/2015 projects, and he contributed regularly to policy developments on citizen participation in the UN and EU decision-making. Prior to CIVICUS, he was Head of Partnerships & International at the National Council for Voluntary Organisations (UK); he was also a co-drafter of the Council of Europe's 'Code of Good Practice on Civil Participation'. He is half-Brazilian and started his career working on participatory budgeting in the cities and rainforests of Brazil.



Joanna Masic is the Global Lead for the Sustainable City Infrastructure and Services for the World Bank's Urban, Disaster Risk Management, Resilience, and Land Global Practice. She is Lead Urban Specialist, Cities and Climate change in the Europe and Central Asia Region, based in Brussels. Ms. Masic is an Environmental Scientist and Geographer with over 20 years' experience managing sustainable city infrastructure lending, grants and advisory services across Asia and Europe. She holds an MSc in Environmental Epidemiology and Policy from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and an MA in Environmental Science and Geography from the University of Dundee, UK. She is a Chartered Scientist (UK Science Council) and Chartered Water and Environment Manager (UK Chartered Institute of Water and Environment Management).



Dr. Timea Ignat, Chief Scientific Officer at Neolithics, Israel. After having studied Food Process Engineering at the Szent Istvan University, Hungary, she obtained in 2012 PhD in Food Science at the Corvinus University of Budapest, Hungary. Afterward she was accepted for a postdoctoral fellowship at the Volcani Institute, Agricultural Research Organization, Israel, where she specialized primarily in fresh produce non-destructive quality determination by means of sensor and data fusion and machine learning algorithms. She established a new quality index by data fusion of different chemical, textural, and visual attributes of the fresh produce. She developed a non-linear machine learning algorithm based on spectroscopy and proximal sensing for optimal harvest time determination. A number of research outcomes have already been implemented, for example the date quality measurement system at Eshet Eilon Advanced

Grading & Packing Technologies. She was granted a second postdoctoral fellowship in the Remote Sensing Laboratory at the Ben-Gurion University of the Negev, where she worked on proximal and remote sensing data acquisition, image processing, and machine learning algorithms. She was responsible for managing a multispectral and thermal imaging-based algorithm development for agricultural crop quality detection. She recently established and implemented a novel spectral vegetation index to detect vegetation stress. Presently she is responsible for the research and development of hyperspectral imaging systems for fresh produce quality determination at Neolithics. Helen Holden Slottje, Esq., Slottje Law, and the 2014 Goldman Environmental Prize Winner for North America. Helen was awarded the Goldman Environmental Prize for her pioneering legal work that successfully defended New York communities from environmentally destructive fracking (high-impact industrialized extraction of natural gas from solid rock). In the face of a state statute that prohibited local regulation of the oil and gas industry, and a state-wide regulatory agency with the mission of promoting the oil and gas industry, Helen was undaunted. She developed an innovative strategy that employed constitutionally protected local land use planning powers to prohibit fracking. With the help of her husband David, Helen worked tirelessly to ensure that communities could refuse to host fossil fuel extraction through enacting local laws. With the Slottjes' help, over 150 communities across the state organized and passed

local measures to stop fracking. These local laws faced heavy opposition and ultimately litigation from powerful entrenched interests that sought to have the laws declared unenforceable. In a major victory for the people, the New York courts upheld these local fracking bans. Ultimately this community-based resistance led to an unprecedented state-wide ban on fracking, a true David and Goliath victory. Helen continues to bring her unique insights and legal advice to purpose driven businesses that seek to incorporate sustainable development goals into their culture. Helen is an Honorary Advisor of the NGOCS-D-NY and as a member of the Urban Cluster. .

In December 2020, the UN2020 campaign was renamed the Coalition for the UN We Need. Jeffery had previously represented CIVICUS as UN Representative (NY), where he was an organizing partner of the UN DESA NGO Major Group (2011-2016) responsible for

guiding multi-stakeholder engagement of NGOs in the lead up to Rio+20 through the adoption of the 2030 Agenda. He was Chair of the 65th UN DPI/NGO Conference, "2015 and Beyond: Our Action Agenda", UN HQ NY, 27-29 August 2014. He was also Chair of the NGO/DPI Executive Committee (2007-2011), helping to organize the annual UN DPI/NGO Conferences hosted abroad in Paris (2008), Mexico City (2009), Melbourne (2010) and Bonn (2011).
